What is the feeding regimen?

Grain: ground corn, alfalfa, soy meal, oats and wheat, molasses, vitamins such as: A, choline, B-12 and 18% crude protein.

What does Durham Ranch do to ensure the animals are treated with respect?

Durham Ranch Rabbits are raised on small, family-farms. The majority of farms are Amish and in the Midwest. The animals are raised in buildings that are comfortable and safe from predators where rabbits can move around freely. They are in a space of eight square feet after being weaned from their mother. Each farm follows proper herd health management and sanitation practices to allow for disease free rabbits.

At what age are they harvested and why?

Rabbits are harvested at 12 weeks or younger when they are most tender.

What is the weight of the animals at harvest?

Durham Ranch Rabbits are harvested between 5-6 pounds.
