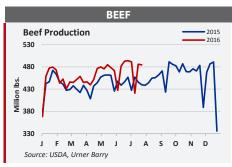








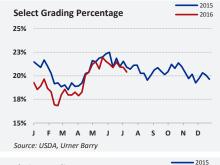


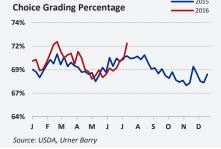












## BEEF COMMENTARY

Demand for boxed beef remained suppressed, a rather typical market condition for a third week in July. Oppressive heat and humidity across many regions of the U.S played a role in lackluster retail business. Middle meats devaluing forced carcass cutouts lower. End cuts and thin meats also found diminished spot market values develop. Urner Barry's Choice Carcass Cutout broke through the \$200/cwt barrior this week, the last time that occurred was late in December of 2015. Urner Barry's Brisket Cutout broke 14.84% lower.

**LIVE CATTLE:** Cash cattle sales developed midweek, and follow through trading was very minimal on Thursday and Friday. Negative pressure was applied by weaker boxed beef and futures markets. The live animal sold between \$113/cwt and \$115/cwt, mainly at \$115/cwt, down \$2/cwt from week prior sales. Carcass sales were spread between \$179/cwt and \$188/cwt, with the bulk of sales at \$184/cwt to \$186/cwt, moving a few dollars lower from week ago range of trade.

**SLAUGHTER & BEEF PRODUCTION:** The weekly F.I. Slaughter was assessed at 595,000 head compared to last week's 598,000 head harvest.

Live cattle weights posted a 3 pound gain to 1339 pounds. Dressed cattle weights edged higher to now tip the scales at 816 pounds.

**RIBS:** Rib primal carcass cutout values moved lower by 2.40%-Choice basis, 9.60%-Select, pushed lower by seasonal weak demand.

**CHUCKS:** Further losses with chuck prices occurred this week. Demand for end cuts remains only seasonally average.

**ROUNDS:** Early week slippage in value for a few round cuts pushed the Round Primal Cutout value lower. As the week closed, beef processors were a bit more confident with wholesale offerings.

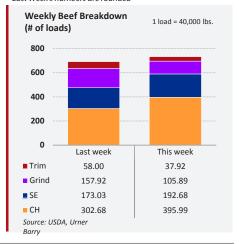
**LOINS:** Strips and short loins were main contributors to total carcass values moving lower this week. Peeled tenderloins found a bit of support leading to steady/higher wholesale values.

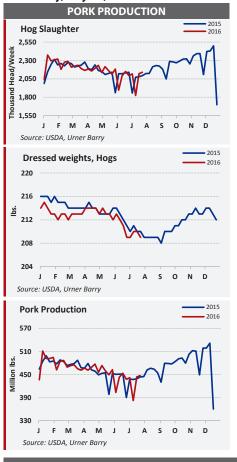
**GROUND BEEF:** Ground beef values this past week deviated very little from week prior levels. Demand was fairly steady as hamburger meat and patty sales were just enough to allow the steady wholesale trading.

**BONELESS BEEF:** Fresh 90s trended lower as the week developed. Supplies were more readily available in some regions. Prices continue to hold higher than some participants expected for this time of year. The market for fresh 50s steady to a little better this week. Demand continues to be active. This week's cattle slaughter was estimated at 595,000 head. Year-to-date beef production is up 4.1% compared to the equivalent time period for last year.

# PORK COMMENTARY

The Urner Barry pork carcass cutout moved from \$90.88/cwt last Friday to \$90.32/cwt to close this week. Hams declined this week, bellies and trimmings were generally supported and fresh pork mostly traded in narrow ranges, reflecting summer doldrums.

**PORK PRODUCTION:** Total pork production for the week ending July 23, 2016 was estimated at 447.4 million lbs. This was .7 percent over the previous week and 1.9 percent higher than the same week a year ago. Average live weights, at 278 pounds, were one pound under last week and a year ago.

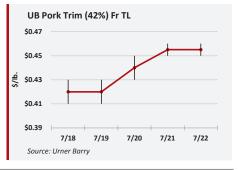
**GREEN MEATS:** In the green meat complex, hams declined across the board while bellies and most of trim managed to maintain seasonal support. Discounted offerings out of Canada pressured domestic price sheets, which led to the quotations for bone-in and boneless hams moving notably lower by midweek.

**HAMS:** 17 to 27lb hams were \$1.00 to \$11.00/cwt lower this week with the largest losses occurring among 23/27 pound hams. Boneless hams were \$5.00/cwt higher.

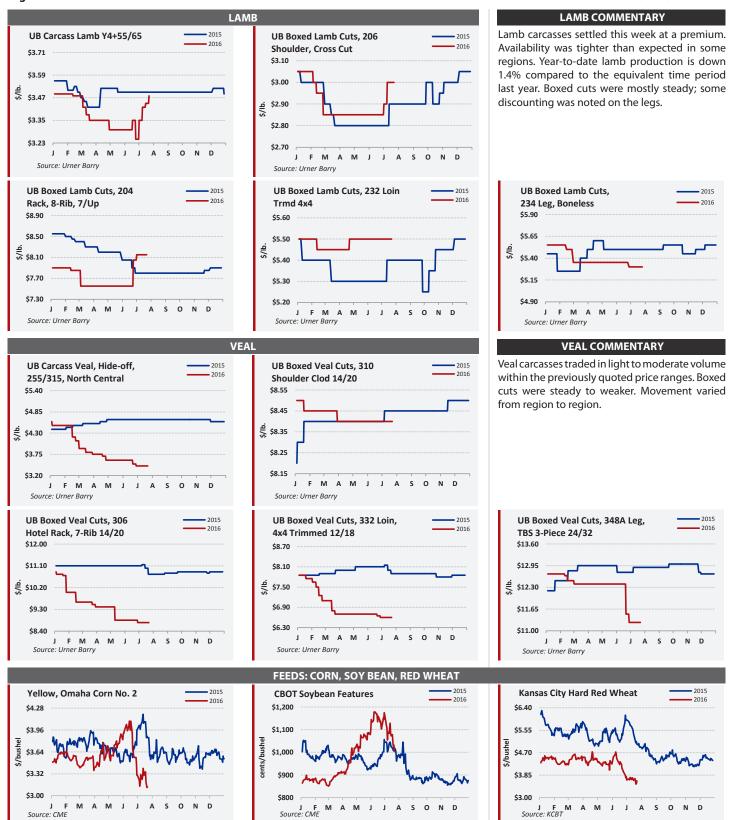
**BELLIES:** Square-cut and skinless bellies closed the week \$2.00 to \$8.00/cwt higher.

**TRIMMINGS:** Fresh 42s gained \$3.00/cwt while 72s declined by \$2.00/cwt on the week. Boneless picnics were \$2.00/cwt higher by Friday.

**RETAIL:** Trade in fresh pork has become increasingly dull in recent sessions. Midsummer is typically a slower demand period and it appears that we're entering that phase. Additionally, low wholesale prices and the prospect of steadily increasing production are providing little urgency. This week, the loin component was narrowly mixed; showing little in the way of true direction. Picnic and cushion values improved, in-line with the move in boneless picnics. Meanwhile, the butt market began to moderate; up counter-seasonally in recent weeks, the market was off \$1.00 to \$2.00/ cwt this week. The recent sell-off in spareribs spawned opportunity. There's renewed interest in frozen spareribs at renewed levels that has become somewhat price supportive. This week, spareribs gained \$4.50 to \$6.50/cwt on average. St. Louis Ribs were unchanged and Loin Back Ribs still steady to weak.



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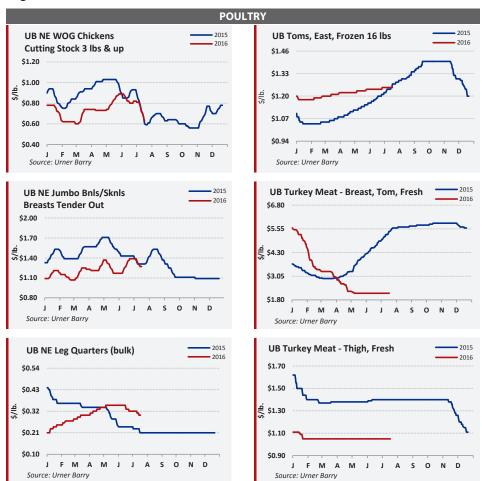

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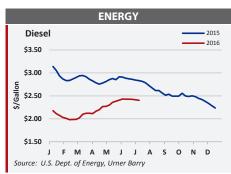




Is there a better word than "bipolar" to describe the chicken breast meat market this week? On Monday, breast meat was sloppy and weak. As the week progressed however, supplies tightened and so did the trading levels. As the market closed on Friday, offerings were limited and held with increased confidence. Reports have already surfaced that suggest supplies are going to be no more than adequate if not short next week, thanks in part to the heat continues to hinder the grow-out. According to sources, demand is only fair at retail and foodservice, but it's active at the plant to plant level. Tenders are in a similar position. The urgency for spot loads was not as visible as it was for breast meat, but buyers were cleaning up what was available at supported values. Wings close the week rated mostly steady. Whole birds and WOGs improved over the couple of days, but some plants were still discounting on Friday in order keep product moving. In the dark meat complex, whole legs, bone-in thighs, thigh meat and leg meat are rated at least steady to full steady. Domestic and export demand has picked up and is expected to remain strong in the weeks to come. Leg quarters

and drumsticks continue to test.

Here at week's end ere at Herethe amount of trading in the turkey market has improved in terms of consistency and volume so that's something which is allowing players to be a little more upbeat. But overall written business is at mostly steady price points or at price points which are still drifting lower. The ongoing exception to the rule is whole body turkeys. In this arena we find full price support when limited offerings of either toms or hens are haggled over. Otherwise business is mixed and inconsistent with offerings generally adequate for needs. Drums are about steady but we would have to rate whole wings, necks and tom two joints as still unsettled. The meat complex is characterized adequate to ample frozen offerings and balanced but adequate fresh supplies. Our quotations close the week unchanged as we await further developments. We can't say that much has changed in the bone-in breast segment and we rate both consumer and institutional weights as adequate for needs and mostly steady.
